

Africa: A Look Back by James Haskins and Kathleen Benson


Detailing life in Africa before, and at the beginning, of the transatlantic slave trade. Focuses on the example of four different men, and their stories.


The Slave Trade and the Middle Passage by S. Pearl Sharp


Follow the people who were taken from Africa as slaves, tracing their journey across the Atlantic Ocean to the Americas.


The Atlantic Slave Trade by Don Nardo



Harriet Tubman: A Journey to Freedom by Sandra A. Agard

A biography about abolitionist Harriet Tubman--from childhood on a plantation to her work as a nurse and key role in the Underground Railroad.



The Last Safe House by Barbara Greenwood

A dramatic story of the Underground Railroad as seen through the eyes of two young girls--Eliza, a runaway slave, and Johanna, whose family gives her refuge. Stories, information, and activities bring history to life in this moving portrayal of slavery and friendship, cruelty and kindness, prejudice and courage.

Birchtown and the Black Loyalists by Wanda Lauren Taylor

The incredible story of the Black Loyalists of Birchtown for young readers. With educational and accessible language, readers are introduced to the journey of Black American soldiers taken from Africa as slaves, their quest for freedom, the settlement and struggle of Black Loyalists on Nova Scotian soil, and the enduring spirit of their descendants in spite of a history marked by hardship and loss.

Making Their Mark by Spring Hermann




I see the Promised Land by Arthur Flowers and Manu Chitrakar


A graphic narrative telling Martin Luther King's story through the major events that occurred in the apartheid South during his lifetime.


March (series) by John Lewis

Black Canadians by Joseph Mensah




When They Call You a Terrorist by Patrisse Khan-Cullors






